

NOVEMBER 18, 1926

On the gentle mountain breeze, the distant sound of hymns float across the verdant valley vibrant with autumn leaves of the sugar maple, scarlet oak, sweetgum, and hickory trees. Voices and banjo melt together in harmonious disorder. Late in November, the frost has graced the hills for several weeks now, but the afternoon sun is still warm. Most of the harvest has been put up after months of hard work, and the evidence of the labor of a community is visible in barn lofts piled high with fragrant hay, beds topped with freshly filled straw mattresses, wheat crops put up, and cotton sacks filled with dried beans and wild chestnuts. Potatoes, carrots, parsnips, and cabbage are stored in hay lined pits in the now lifeless garden. Bushels of apples have been exchanged for winter clothes and shoes; the excess processed into apple butter and canned for the winter. Sturdy cabins, already weathered by many winters of smoky mountain wind and rain, are warm with the glow of oil lamps. Pantries are lined with shining glass jars filled with blackberry, blueberry, and gooseberry jam as well as a variety of grown and foraged vegetables. Inside one of these sturdy log cabins, several families gather in the glow of the fireplace. Chestnuts gathered earlier in the fall are roasting and crackling on the fireplace, their sweet earthy aroma filling the air. The annual chore of corn husking was the day's event, with families gathering under the premise that "many hands make light work." After a full day of work, the apple cider and the banjo appear, and the community gossip commences.

The inhabitants of this secluded valley nestled in the Great Smoky Mountains are a tenacious and hardy people, individualistic but always willing to help a neighbor. Hardworking, they labor through all seasons to provide for their families and livestock; God-fearing, they cannot help but find Him in the hazy blue majesty of the mountains rising above the lush meadows and in the bounty of the valley. Resilient and resolute, they overcome division, poverty, and difficult circumstances with the understanding that "it'll all quilt in" in the end.

Instead of only viewing this merely as a time simple and long forgotten, what if we learned from the strength of this people, from the faith and determination they exude? What if we applied that same tenacity to our own lives? What if we lived with the intentionality of helping our neighbor, providing for our families, valuing the land, and taking God at His Word? What if we, in times uncertain and restless, instead of losing our gaze in the confusion around us, lifted our eyes unto the hills, trusting that the Lord is our strength? Maybe we don't have the privilege of soaking in the misty mountains of rural Appalachia. Let today find us pondering the invaluable importance of returning to our own roots and spending time in the splendor of creation. Maybe we can't live in the hills, but we can always turn our eyes *Unto the Hills*.

A NOTE FROM OUR DIRECTOR



Unto the Hills, like one of its predecessors, Katie's Hope, is a work of historical fiction. That is, the background for the story is historical fact, but the story itself, and the characters in it, are fictional. And we've even taken a few liberties with the setting.

But Cades Cove was indeed a thriving, prosperous community of between 600 and 700 folks – secluded but not isolated – in the Great Smoky Mountains of Tennessee until around 1926 when Congress authorized a new national park, and the town slowly disappeared.

When Denise and I visited the site of the former community (which is the most popular destination in The Great Smoky Mountains National Park, visited by 2 million people annually) and learned some of its character and history, we began to think there might be a musical in there, somewhere!

There are differing accounts of where the name "Cades" came from, but the "Cove" part of the name has nothing to do with water. It is so called because it is a tranquil, beautiful valley "cove" surrounded by mountains. And the folks who lived there formed a tight-knit, hard-working, independent, spiritual community who, in a lot of ways, were like one big family.

But, like any family, there were disagreements and arguments and difficult times. The creation of the national park fueled some of those anxieties and arguments. And therein we found our story.

Because, the fact is, years before we knew much of anything about Cades Cove, Denise and I had felt led to write our next musical around the theme of forgiveness. And when we began to do some research about this special place, we realized that some of the hardships they faced might lend themselves to that subject.

But let me tell you, forgiveness can be a tough subject! Both to live through and write about. And I think it's something that probably everyone has to deal with in one way or another, at one time or another. We hope this story means something for you.

And we are so pleased to be able to finally bring this musical to the public! We cast the show over 3 years ago, thinking that we would be producing it back then. But then, of course, stuff happened (you all know what!), and since then, it's just been a series of starts and stops. We're so grateful to our wonderful cast, as most of them were able to stick with us through the long wait!

We are especially thankful to CrossPointe Church and Pastors Nathan Hansen and Jake Foster for stepping up, just this last summer, to partner with us as we produce this show! It's been a wonderful experience working with all these good folk here!

And, of course, we thank the Lord for the miraculously opened doors that brought us to this moment.

Finally, we thank each of you, our audience, for coming today! We hope you'll enjoy this glimpse of rural Appalachia in the 1920's, as we highlight the lives and struggles of some of the good people who lived there – even if it is in a fictional story. Let their stories, and their struggle for forgiveness and restoration in the midst of trouble stir your hearts and your imaginations.

And if you ever have a chance to travel to Eastern Tennessee, be sure and spend some time in the peacefulness of Cades Cove. And remember those who sacrificed their lands and livelihoods so that we, today, can enjoy the breathtaking beauty of God's creation in the Smoky Mountains. We, like the daffodils, should never forget. (Don't worry...if you listen closely, you'll understand what that means...)
